Lost in the Blizzard

Sanborn, Dec. 30—Time was when narrow escapes and nerve-trying experiences from being lost in blizzards were of frequent occurrence, and even tragic deaths in the fierce storms of winter were not uncommon in this section of Dakota. Nearly every old timer can relate personal experiences of having been lost in a blizzard and escaped death by a miracle. But nowadays these experiences are few and far between.

The foregoing was called to mind by the unpleasant adventure of Romanus Linn, Postmaster Langer's assistant, last evening about 5:30 o'clock while going to supper. He had fought his way against the storm and had arrived within a few yards of his boarding place, when he turned his back to the storm for a breathing spell and concluded to "back up" toward the house. It was Mr. Linn's first experience in a Dakota blizzard, being a new comer. When he ceased backing and undertook to get his bearing the house and all other houses had disappeared and he at once became confused. As is usual in such cases he took the wrong direction, and being on the edge of town, soon got into the country, where he wandered about in the fierce storm and gathering darkness for an hour and a half, finally bringing up against the barn on the Boughten farm just north of town.

Mr. Boughten stepping to his back door for something heard calls from the direction of the barn. He followed them and found Mr. Linn completely dazed and confused, scarcely

able to tell his name, and guided him to the house.

Meanwhile it became known to Mr. Langer that Linn had not reached his boarding house, and as soon as it was found that he was not in town, searching parties, one of which went as far as the Jaberg and Jacobs places, started out and scoured the neighborhood. Chas. Grannis and Pete Reid called at the Boughten place soon after his discovery by Mr. Boughten, and the search ended.
