MRS. BENJAMIN FORD IS DEAD

She Breathed Her Last at 3:45 O'clock Last Friday Afternoon.

Mrs. Benjamin Ford is dead. The word flew over our town as on the wings of wind, wherever it touched it left sorrow, and the expressions of sympathy for the bereaved ones were many and from the heart.

Miss Frances Ella Wheeler was born in Nashua, New Hampshire on June 9, 1845, and died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. August Evers, in this village, at 3:45, last Friday afternoon, June 11, making her 64 years and two days at the time of her death. She has not been in the best of health for a year yast, being troubled more or less, during that time with that dread disease, dropsy, which has slowly taken her life away.

In the year 1858, she moved with her parents to Fillmore county, Minnesota. Her father was an overseer in a large cotton mill in New Hampshire, and was a member of the Minnesota legislature for two terms. On Dec. 31, 1861, she was married to Benjamin Ford, in Fillmore county. In 1890 they moved to

North Dakota, settling on a farm near Sanborn. From there they moved to Valley City, and later to Fargo. In 1898 Mr. Ford filed on homestead south of town, moving to town after he had proved up, making their home with their daughter, Mrs. August Evers.

Four children—two boys and two girls—were born to their union. The two boys, Horace and Willie, and one girl, Addie, died when they had grown to young manhood and young womanhood, and with the exception of Horace, who was buried in Wisconsin, they are buried in the cemetery at Valley City.

Mrs. Ford died an easy death. She ate her dinner, as usual, with the members of the family, and was sitting in a rocking chair when she breathed her last. She was conscious to the very end, bidding a fond farewell to her loved ones.

Funeral services were conducted at the house at one o'clock Monday afternoon, by Rev. W. W. Hart, of Cooperstown. A large concourse of friends attended the obsequies, The remains were then taken to Valley City and interred in the family burying grounds.

Happy and cheerful, she carried sunshine with her wherever she went. She had always a smile and a pleasant word for her friends. This life has passed into the joy of her Lord, the memory of her life must prove a perpetual inspiration.
