

# DAZEY GETS SHORT END

Ball Game on the Home Diamond Resulted Disastrously for the "Wonders."

The all-salaried team of Dazey dropped its first league game to the locals on the local diamond, last Friday afternoon in a ten-inning contest by a 5 to 4 score. It was one of the fastest exhibitions seen along the branch this season.

It was Thrall's turn in the box for Dazey, with Lynch, of Northern league fame, on the receiving end. The Rochester wonder allowed every man on the local team one or more hits, swelling the team's splendid batting average from .277 to something in the 80s. "Smiles" Sievert, the only man the locals have to rely on, was sent in to do similar stunts, minus the allowance of so many hits. He allowed eight safeties while Thrall allowed 12.

The game was replete with sensational stunts, the catches by Alfson and E. Ringlee and the hitting of A. Ringlee. Thrall and Lund figuring prominently. The latter two received five of Dazey's eight hits.

Binford received its first two runs in the second frame on a two-bagger by Carlander and another by Lewis, followed by an overthrow of third by Bodman. Two more were added in the fourth on singles by E. Ringlee, Gulliver and Alfson.

Sievert held Dazey runless until the seventh, when Thrall hit for two sacks, Bodman sacrificing him to third and scoring on Lynch's single. They knotted the score in the eighth when Bartlett was hit by pitcher, Lund skied out to pitcher, Shirley hit safe, Ferring was safe on error by Alfson. With the bases full Becker hit to shortstop, Bartlett being forced out at the plate. With two out Thrall got his second two-bagger driving in three runs.

Both teams went out in short order in the ninth, Dazey failed to score in the tenth. Peterson was first up for Binford and was safe on a hot one to first base. And then—oh! you kid—Ringlee, that stocky catcher, slams one on the nose for the railroad track, scoring Peterson. The game ended 5 to 4.

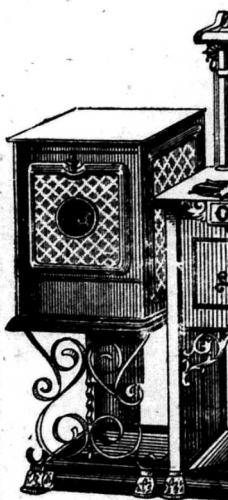

The Rickshaw in Japan.

In 1871 the introduction of the jinriksha (man-power cart), now anglicized over the East as rickshaw, came at a critical time for the immense hordes of bearers and porters who had been employed on the great main roads. These men had supplied the demands of the processions of the territorial and smaller daimyo on their journeys to and from Yeddo and when the shogun proceeded to do homage to the secluded emperor in Kioto. These had been out of work since 1868, and much distress was experienced.



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
