Griggs County Sentinel—

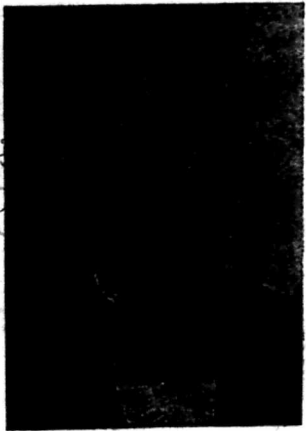
