

## MORRIS GREENLAND.

Death finally came last Friday afternoon to relieve the suffering of Morris Greenland, who has been in a practically helpless condition for the past year, suffering from paralysis.

For two years or more ago his health began to fail him until he was compelled to give up his work with the lumber company, and commence taking medical treatment in the hope of regaining his lost vigor, but all this proved of no avail, and about a year ago he resigned himself to his fate—death coming as a blessing after a tedious suffering.

Deceased was born in Norway on Feb. 29, 1880. He came to this country in 1900, and made his home first in Cooperstown. He then came to Binford and was employed with the Gull River Lumber company as second man and remained in that capacity until he moved to Mose, to take charge of the yard there. While he was there a change was made in the name of the town from "Lewis" to "Mose"—in honor of Mr. Greenland, who had been nick-named "Mose." He removed from there to Esmond, where he remained for three years, and when a change was made in the agents at this point, he asked to be transferred here, and continued with the company until he was obliged to abandon his labors on account of his health.

He was married on July 30, 1906, to Miss Olga Rorvig, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ole Rorvig, and to that union two children were born, both boys, Marvin four years and Oswald three years.

Morris was a man of quiet and unassuming disposition, and a bigness of heart that made for him everlasting friends. We always found him to be a straight and square man and we feel that we have lost a true friend, a good man and a good citizen. He was conscientious in all he did, a man of sterling worth and integrity. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. of Binford. He carried a \$2000 life insurance policy in an old line company.

The funeral was held Saturday afternoon at the Norwegian Lutheran church, Rev. Sweger officiating. The pall bearers were John Knapp, Otto Knapp, Stephen Rorvig, A. Norstrum, Oscar Idsvoog and Theo. Kittelson. Interment was made in the Binford cemetery.
