STALLION INSPECTION THIS MONTH

Inspector Will be in Binford One Day Only, Tuesday, June 9.

There will be an inspection of stallions by the Stallion Registration Board at the different places in each county specified below.

All parties having stallions to be inspected should have them at one of the livery barns before the appointed hour in order not to miss the inspector. There are but a few horses to be inspected this year at each point, and much territory must be covered each day.

This will be the only inspection this year.

Blood samples of stallions and mares for dourine test will be taken wherever desired.
