

Pigger Pulled.

Sentinel: Westley Gardner and James Clay were arrested by Sheriff Lee and Deputy Riley last Sunday morning at an early hour at the old house near the bridge just north of the site of the Great Northern bridge in Broadview, on a charge of selling intoxicating liquor as a beverage.

The sheriff had evidently been tipped off and he and Riley drove down there Saturday evening and left their team at a near-by farm. They then walked down to the house near the wagon bridge and inquired if a run-away team had been seen, saying that they had lost their team. From there they went down to the site of the new bridge. Later they returned to the house and asked for something to eat, which was prepared for them. While they were eating several bridge workers were in the room drinking beer. Lee and Riley then bought some beer and left and later returned, stating that they had found their team. They bought some more beer and then arrested the two men who had handed them the beer and brought them and a large quantity

of beer to town and the prisoner's were lodged in jail.

They were given their hearings on Monday before Justice Rearick. Gardner waived examination and was bound over to the district court, bail being fixed in the sum of five hundred dollars. Clay asked for a hearing, which was given him, and after Sheriff Lee, Deputy Riley, Gardner and Clay were all sworn and heard, Clay was dismissed on motion of the states attorney, it appearing that he was a trapper and had nothing to do with selling beer excepting that as a bystander he had handed Riley two bottles at the request of Gardner, who was then lying down.

Gardner was taken to Jamestown Tuesday by Sheriff Lee, accompanied by States Attorney Tufte and Clerk Gunder Frigaard, where he plead guilty before Judge Coffey and was sentenced to serve a term of 90 days in the county jail and pay a fine of \$200.
