Harvested This Week in Kingsley Township.

Gaiggs county not only has the distinction of having the highest average paoduction of wheat for the past ten years prior to 1910, but it is also some "big potato" when it

comes to raising spuds. This week John Sperger and Carl Bick and a large crew of men are

engaged in harvesting the big crop and it is estimated that when the task is completed they will have in the neighborhood of 40,000 bushels.

Two diggers and 24 men are employed and up to Monday night about 18,000 bushels had been picked. The potatoes are dumped into sacks and i placed in a large pit, 70 feet long, 30 feet wide and eight feet deep.

An enormous number of sacks is required—their supply at present being nearly exhausted, but a carload has been ordered and will reach them in ample time so they will experience no delay or inconvenience

on that account. The land on which these potatoes have grown is owned by Joe Ebentier and Jake Westerhousen. These gentlemen granted the growers free use of their land with the under-

standing that they cultivate the potatoes properly, thereby cleaning the land of weeds and foul seed and also adding to the fertility of the soil. The men have done this and Mr. Ebentier and Mr. Westerhousen 3. are satisfied that better results have p been obtained this way than would a have been the case had the land been ١.
