A Number of Cases Were Disposed of at the Court Session Last Week.

The fall session of the district court opened at Cooperstown Monday of last week wite Judge J. A. Coffey on the bench.

The following were made citizens of the United States: John Antonson, Ole Flogstad, Nils Varioe, John Hanstad, Karl J. Sundahl. Martin Jenson of Walum, pleaded

guilty to the charge of maintaining e l a common nuisance and was sentenced to 20 days in jail and to pay the cost of \$45. Olaf Elvrum from near Binford

was tried on a charge of taking a load of oats that did not belong to him. The jury found him not guilty. The case of E. D. Williams vs.

e Elizabeth Williams was granted a ١. divorce. The disposition of the 8 children and the property was not n determined at the time of the writ-ing.

Trimble-Winton Co. got judgement by default against P. A. Lindgren of Cooperstown. There were two road cases, one

from Pilot Mound and one from Romness. The Pilot Mound case was decided in favor of John and E. C. Moe who objected to a new road across their land. The Romness case in which H. H. Koloen was the plaintiff, is taken under advisement by the judge. Monotuck Silk Co. got a judgment il
