

NEW LAW POPULAR.

Griggs County Farmers Are Registering the Names of Their Farms.

The law which became effective July 1, permitting owners of farms to register their names with the register of deeds for \$1, is proving popular. Four have filed their names with Register of Deeds Garlid of Griggs county. Martin Wold of Bryan township, has given his farm his own name, the "Wold Farm," Chas. O. Johnson of Willow township, has called his "Silver Creek," ~~E. L. Fuglestad of Ball Hill,~~ has followed the example of Mr. Wold and christened it the "Fuglestad Farm," and Jos. Miller's farm in the town of Lenora, will be known as "Elder Grove." The man who first files a record of a name has a monopoly on that particular name in the county. No subsequent person can use it without his consent. Farmers in other counties can use the same name.

The advantage of having the name registered is that it gives the owner a fixed name for his farm that he can use on his letter heads and for those who specialize in stock of any kind or butter, or any form of produce the name is a kind of a trademark.
