Sentinel: Griggs county voted in favor of the herd law at the November election, and inasmuch as there has been some misunderstanding of the matter, a few words in explanation may not be amiss. States Attorney Tufte is of the opinion that the law became effective as soon as the votes were counted and it was declared carried by the canvassing board; that all horses, cattle, etc., may run at large, but that they may be taken up and held for damages as soon as they do any particular damage (worthy of notice or controversy) and held by persons taking them up until such damages have been determined and settled. Mr. Tufte recommends, however, that everyone be considerate. Stock trespassing upon fields and meadows where there is no grain or hay or trees to damage, can not be held. But stock that invades the premises, barn yard for dwelling house grounds, of another by day or by night, would no doubt be regarded as trespossing and subject to the payment of de
