A steady rain of about three hours duration visited this section Monday. Of course it was no young flood, but it was actually wet and indicated that it can rain in North Dakota—still—or yet, despite the adverse predictions. The moisture was not enough to revolutionize crop conditions, but it will be extremely helpful to late wheat and flax, corn, potatoes, hay, and other forage crops. The farmers here are predicting that the crop in this county will average about seven bushels to the acre.

Hannaford Enterprise: The Great Northern work on the grades in this vicinity is being carried forward rapidly. Both the steam shovels have been working uninterruptedly the past week and in addition a crew of men and a number of teams have started to grade on this side of the creek and just south of town. The G. N. line will cross the N. P. line and side track a few rods south of the stockyard. It is possible that the grade along the entire line will be finished this fall. Out of Fargo about twenty miles of grade is already completed and it is reported that at Surry, the west end of the line, the work of laying ties and rails will commence about the first of August.
