## J. D. Carrolf Dea

week's issue of the New Rockford Transcript contained the following writeup of the death of J. D. Carroll, a brother of Robert Carrol of Binford, and well known

to many of our readers: A telegram to General Merchant Thos. Turner, of Brandtford, con-

veyed the news of the death of Hon. J. D. Carroll, which occurred in a Minneapolis hospital Tuesday eve-

ning at ten o'clock, following an operation. The telegram gave no particulars outside of the bare news of his death and that of the operation.

Mr. Turner departed on the early morning Soo train from Carrington Wednesday morning for Minneapolis. John D. Carroll was one of the

early pioneers of Eddy county, having located on a large ranch on the banks of Lake Washington in the eastern part of the county, which is yet known as the Carroll ranch. He served two terms as sheriff of the county, and also represented what was at that time the Twenty-Second Legislative District, composed of Eddy, Foster and Wells counties, in the state senate. He was a man of many good qualities, genial disposition, and had a wide acquaintance

throughout the state. He served with credit to himself and honor to the district while senator, and made a good record as sheriff. The family moved to Anoka, Minnesota a few years ago, and have been residents 4 of Minneapolis for the past four years. Mrs. Carroll died on September 31st last, from cancer of the breast. Deceased leaves two daughters, Mrs. Thos. Turner, of Brantford, and Mrs. Chas. Turner of Min-

neapolis, besides a son, Will. The remains were taken to Oskaloosa, Iowa, where they were interred in the family lot beside the wife who so lately preceded him over the Dark River. The many friends of these old pio-
