YOUNG MAN PASSED AWAY

Ludvig Olson, Son of Gilbert Olson, Died Suddenly in Minneapolis, Last Thursday.

It was with deep sorrow that relatives and friends learned of the sudden death of Ludvig Olson at Minneapolis. He was taken ill on Saturday with spinal menengitis and on Monday was removed to the city hospital for treatment. His father and brother were sent for and were at his bedside when he passed away. He was ill only six days, his death occuring on Thursday, May 17th.

Ludvig Olson was born in Griggs county on the home farm east of Binford, on November 10, 1893, and was about 23 years and six months of age at the time of his demise. His mother died in 1896. The surviving relatives who mourn the loss of a son and brother, are his father, Gilbert Olson, one brother, Oscar, of near Jessie, and two sisters, Miss Wendella, of near Jessie, and Mrs. Clara Aasboe, of Williams county.

The deceased was attending the law school at the University of Minnesota when he was taken ill, and would have completed his course this spring. He was an exceptionally bright and studious young man, possessed of sterling qualities and industrious habits.

The remains were brought to Binford on Friday for burial. The funeral services were held from the West Prairie church Sunday afternoon, Rev. Fjelstad officiating and paying a beautiful tribute to the memory of the deceased. The casket was covered with many beauti-

ful floral designs presented by loving hands, all of which spoke of peace, purity and immortality.

Twine Plant Closes.

With the bonus system in full operation, the North Dakota prison twine plant has just completed the most successful standard twine "campaign" in the history of the institution. For the last month the daily production has averaged 600 pounds over the 13,000 pound daily maximum, adding each day \$4.50 to the collective paycheck of the 75 men employed, or 6 cents for each individual. The men like the bonus system, and it is resulting in much greater production at only a slightly increased cost.

The manufacture of standard sisal twine has been completed for the season, with a production of 2,200,000 pounds. The plant is now turning out Manila twine. Fibres are still going up. Manila has advanced 3 cents in the last two weeks, and now is selling at 18 to 28 cents. Sisal remains at 17 cents, but the Mexican government, effective May 15, established a new system of inspection and grading which probably will mean an advance in price for the better classes of fibre.

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The prison prices for twine have been fixed for the year at 14 cents for standard and 16 cents for Manila.
