They fo F responded to an encore, singing "Doan' Yo' Lisen." Their voices S blended beautifully, and these two numbers were very pleasing and M heartily applauded. Two more numbers by the band followed, after which a chorus of mixed voices rendered a humorous song, "Cousin Jeddidiah," and was well-received. fi Part two of the program was interspered with songs and band numbers, and remarks by O. G. Arneson, B manager of the band. He dwelt on C the progress of the band during the r past few months, and concluded his remarks with words of appreciation f for the support and encouragement f accorded the band. Immediately e after the concert the floor was cleared and dancing began, which continued until late in the morning. The total receipts were \$118.50. This amount was sufficient to pay all debts and a small sum remains in the treasury. The band boys are enthusiastic over the success of the concert and dance, and appreciate the kind feeling that was prevalent among the town and country people when approached for financial aid. The public spiritedness of these people goes a long way to insure for Binford a splendid musical organization and the best boosting proposition that any town can have.
