We believe this is the most vital issue confronting the village at this time and some means toward procuring for the village better fire-fighting facilities should not be delayed until a serious conflagration has aroused us to its dire necessity.

The question of a Fourth of July celebration or midsummer festival was taken up, and Otto Pritz, W. E. West and C. E. Peterson were appointed to learn the sentiment of the people which of these is preferable.

The meeting Tuesday evening aroused a greater enthusiasm in the club, and if each individual will continue that same spirit and attend the meetings regularly, much good for the welfare of Binford will be accomplished.

The next regular meeting will be held next Wednesday evening, and a full attendance is desired.
