ize and Discuss Labor and
Wage Problem.

At a meeting which was called by the Binford Commercial club last Priday evening to which the farmers of the community were invited to attend, the labor and wage problem during the harvest and threshing seasons was thoroughly discussed, resulting in the adoption of a uniform price to be paid.

Nearly 75 farmers were in attendmee, many of whom are operators threshing rigs, and all were en thusiastic supporters of the propositon to fix a rate which would be satstactory to all concerned. In past ears much dissatisfaction has been caused by the variance of prices, particularly during the threshing season, and in some cases the thresher has been obliged to close down his rig for a few days during the most favorable weather, owing to a strike of the employees for higher wages. By setting the wage scale at a fair figure and a strict adherence to this scale by all the farmers. this difficulty of securing help and keeping them on the job will be eliminated.

It was unanimously decided to set the wages for harvest at \$3.00 and \$3.50 for threshing.

A free labor bureau is to be established at the post office, in charge of Postmaster Knapp, who will aid the farmers in securing necessary help and also to assist transients in finding employments. A telephone will be installed for the convenience

of the farmers and everything will be done at this end to relieve any emergency that may arise during the busy season.
