## INCREASE IN POSTAL RATES

Two-cent Postal Cards and Threecent Stamps is the New Order.

Postmaster J. A. Knapp has received official word from the postoffice department that under the act of congress approved, Oct. 3, 1917, changing the rate of postage, the department will begin issuing 2-cent postal cards and 3-cent postage stamps and stamped, envelopes as soon as a supply can be furnished.

The order states that it will be

possible, however, to supply them in sufficient quantities to exchange stocks of 1-cent postal cards, 2-cent stamps or 2-cent envelopes held by the public or by postmasters. It will therefore be necessary, beginning Nov. 2, when the new postage rates become effective for postmasters to continue the sale of 1-cent cards and 2-cent envelopes while their stock lasts, and for the public to fix stamps

of the increase of postage.

Printed price lists will be issued to Postmaster Knapp by the post-office department as soon as received from the printer.

the postoffice department. Beginning with the first of this month the Cooperstown postoffice was made the central accounting postoffice for Griggs county.
