First Class Mail Goes on the Rural Routes at the Same Old Rate.

The changes'in postage, while understood by some, are not generally known in full, and a new light was shed on local postage by Postmaster Knapp who had been reading the latest instructions. A letter mailed either at the post office or on a route addressed to some other postoffice requires three cents in postage; but a letter mailed either at the office or on the routes adressed to Binford takes two cepts. That is, if you mail a letter from one of the routes addressed for example to The Times it will go for two cents, or if anyone in the city mails one to a person on a route or in the city it requires two cents postage. Likewise a person on route 1 can mail for two cents a letter to a person on route 2 or 8.

There has been no change in fourth class postage and the circular that formerly went for one cent still continues on its way at the same old price.
