

LIVE STOCK DEVELOPMENT SPECIAL CAR

Meetings Will be Held in Co-operation With Business Men and Farmers' Club in This Vicinity---At Matt Rorvig Farm From 10:00 A. M. to 1.00 P. M. and in Binford Until 4:23 Tuesday, May 18.

A "Livestock Development Special Car" is to be sent out by the Northern Pacific Railway in cooperation with the North Dakota Experiment Station, beginning Monday morning May 17, for a ten days' tour, visiting 27 towns of the state. The idea to be carried out is somewhat different from that of former years. Instead of a special train as last year, a single car will be sent out which can be attached to any passenger train which comes along and taken to the next stopping point. They will carry no livestock with them as was formerly the case, but will depend upon having local men furnish the animals for stock judging and demonstration work at the various points to be visited. The speakers who are to be on the train are W. H. Peters, animal husbandry man for the North Dakota Experiment Station; F. W. Merrill, dairy development agent for the DeDaval Cream

Separator company; H. R. Smith, livestock specialist for the First National bank of St. Paul; Thomas Cooper, director of the North Dakota Experiment station and D. E. Willard, development agent for the Northern Pacific railway. The county field agents of the North Dakota Experimental station will cooperate with train men and work in the districts to be visited making the arrangements for livestock demonstration and judging.

One of the big features of the special car idea is that the speaker will not be held to just visiting a town along the route but it is planned to make several trips, by means of autos, to farms in the various communities visited, and it is planned to spend each forenoon in this way. In this way the speakers will meet with the farmers in the country in the localities where meetings are to be held. A full schedule of the farms

to be visited has been published and mailed ahead. A study of the conditions on the farms in the various communities will be made, and the speakers will direct their efforts at the meetings towards solving the problems as they exist in the different localities visited.

The care and feeding of livestock, both dairy and beef types, the most profitable breeds, the rearing and profitable use of dairy cows, producing beef cattle for profit, hog raising, farm feeds, silos and silage, and the standardization of dairy products will be among the subjects considered. Meetings will also be held in cooperation with business men, with farmers' clubs, and with country agricultural field agents, in such farming communities, neighborhoods or school districts as express a desire to participate in meeting in their communities.
