Fire Marshal Act is Upheld.

The act creating the office of state fire marshal is not an unconstitutional interference with the local government of cities and villages and is therefore not for that reason invalid and the section which empowers the fire marshal subject to appeal to district court to order the removal, destruction or repair of buildings regarded a menace to other property is not unconstitutional, rules the supreme court of North Dakota in affirming the decision of Judge A. G. Burr in the district of Ramsey in favor of A. H. Runge, former state fire marshal, and against I. Glerum.

Where the fire marshal has ordered the destruction of a building, his order will be interfered with upon appeal only where a clear abuse of discretion has been shown, rules the court which holds that it is not necessary as claimed by the defendant and appellant, to the validity of as of the situation, and that such an order that the building shall ould wake up to the fact that have sustained a loss by fire of 50 or duty towards winning the per cent of its value.
