F. W. Blocker sued S. Flick for commission on a land deal which Blocker attemped to put thru. The deal was not according to contract and Blocker lost his case.

Claus Jackson won a case against Arne Luckason. The case involved payment of supplies furnished by Jackson to Luckason's renter.

HANNA PROCLAIMS JUNE 14 FLAG DAY

Asks People of North Dakota to Observe the Day in Proper Spirit.

Governor L. B. Hanna issued the following proclamation:

"Emblematic of liberty and justice the Stars and Stripes for one hundred and thirty-eight years has held a proud position among the nations of the world. Our original constellation of thirteen has been added to from time to time until today forty-eight stars shine within a field of blue, carring to the far corners of the earth the message of our liberty, loyalty and patriotism.

"It is but human that in times of peace and plenty the spirit of patriotism among a people lies dormant—not dead but sleeping—to break forth with renewed vigor should danger threaten. We must remember that in foreign lands other people are following other flags with brave and loyal hearts and deep devotion; and so let us bestir ourselves that we do not fall behind in love of flag and country, and let us give added reverence and devotion to Old Glory, symbolical of a great nation and a patriotic people.

"Now, therefore, I, L. B. Hanna, Governor of the State of North Dakota, do hereby proclaim Monday,
