Canadian Draft Law Hits Many.

Since the arm of the Canadian draft machine extended down into North Dakota to gather in subjects of Great Britain who are residing here, the demand for naturalization papers has increased by leaps and bounds and during the past week over 25 aliens have taken out their naturalization papers in Grand Forks. All were Canadians.

Men who have resided in the United States for many years, many of who did not know they were aliens, have been awakened to the fact by the call of the Kingdom of Great Britain. By taking out their first papers, aliens are entitled to enlist in the American army, if they prefer. This does not release them from their obligations to Canada, however, and if they do not serve here the Dominion may call them in. Canada does not exempt soldiers because of dependents.

IMPROPER FLAVORS IN MILK

If Onions or Garlic Are Eaten by Cow
Odor Will Pass Into Milk—
Feed is Important.

Milk has its natural flavor, which is a pleasant flavor to most people, and then it can have acquired flavors. These are of two kinds. First, from the food the cow eats. If onions or garlic are eaten their odor will be passed into the milk. Some weeds also cause flavors in the milk. Second, the milk will also absorb many odors. To produce milk with a good flavor it is necessary that the cow is not fed anything that will be kept where it can absorb any odors. — North Dakota Experiment Station.

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
