they were no worse. Last Hannaford Enterprise: Thursday this community was visitby a hail storm which did thousands of dollars of damage. The one consolation is that the damage was done in a comparatively small area and in places, even where some hail fell, the crops will not be totally destroyed. The storm came from the northwest t and travelled in a southeasterly direction, apparently following very closely the G. N. right-of-way. The damage from hail started in just east of Revere and continued in a path Ł ł about a mile and a half to two miles wide as far as about four miles east I of Hannaford. In this stretch the s t crops were practically wiped clean, the farmers on the north side I of the tracks being hit harder than 8 those on the south side. Hannaford r was on the edge of the storm as more harm was done in the north edge of town than in the south part, and a few miles south of town there was neither wind, hail nor rain. Win-la dow lights facing west were shattered in most of the buildings unless they were protected by screens. Very few of the farmers hailed out were protected by insurance.
