Ordinance

Prohibiting the construction of Frame Buildings on Whinnery Street, in the Village of Binford.

Be It Ordained by the Village Board of Trustees of the Village of Binford, Griggs County, North Dakota, That no new building shall be constructed on the lots in Blocks 3, 4, 5, and 6, facing Whinnery street, in the Village of Binford, in said county and state, unless same is constructed of brick, stone or cement.

Passed by the Board of said Village May 10, 1916.

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
