

commerce. Unfortunately none of the mail order houses own any property in North Dakota. Several of them have made arrangements with a warehouse company located in Fargo whereby goods are shipped by express or freight from Chicago or other places and are there transhipped by parcel post to the various points in North Dakota. If an attempt was made to levy a tax and to collect it by seizing the goods stored in this warehouse, one would immediately come in conflict with the federal authorities. Commissions in other states are also at work upon this problem and it is hoped that a practical and constitutional method can soon be evolved. When this is done, it will be one of the greatest forward steps in taxation that has been taken in the last fifty years.
