## DEATH OF S. L. GLASPELL

DIED AT HIS HOME AT JAMESTOWN

ON SUNDAY AFTERNOON: AFTER

A LINGERING ILLNESS OF MANY

MONTHS.

On Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock occurred the death of Judge Glaspell at his home at

Jamestown. He had been a

great sufferer for many months from a complication of dropsy

and liver troubles and his phy-

sicians considered his case hope-

less. Judge Glaspell was born in

Davenport, Iowa, in 1852. graduated at the high schools in that city in 1870, afterwards at the law schools at Iowa City, in

1874. He began the practice of law in Davenport where he resided until 1880, when on the

advise of his physicians, on account of poor health he removed to North Dakota, and engag-

ed in farming at Eldridge, near Jamestown, in the expectation

that active outdoor life would be beneficial. The early years of farming, not proving profitable

owing to light crops and various drawbacks incident to a new country, Judge Glaspell returned

to law practice at Jamestown where he has made his home over a quarter of a century. He was active in politics and was elected

member of the last territorial

council of the territory of Dakota. He filled the office of states attorney of the county for

He was elected judge of the Fifth judicial district in 1896, and served on the bench of the district for 8 years. He was regard-

ed as one of the ablest attorneys and judges in the state, and was called from time to time to sit

with the judges of the state supreme court in the hearing of cases before that body. He had

the largest public law library in the state at the time of his death, and has been called to practice in all the courts in the state, and

the federal courts.

He is survived by Mrs. Glaspell, two sons, Donald and Bernard, and one daughter, Mrs. L. B. McLain of Jamestown.

funeral service was held Tuesday afternoon and the remains were shipped to his old home at Davenport, Iowa, for burial.
