

A SAD DEATH

NETTIE HENNINGS SUCCUMBED
YESTERDAY EVENING TO AN
ATTACK OF TYPHOID FEVER
AND PLEURISY.

The news of the sudden death of Miss Nettie Hennings which occurred last evening came as a sudden shock to her host of friends in Courtenay, many of whom had not learned of her illness. She had been sick since the middle of last week with an attack of typhoid fever and pleurisy on both lungs but it was not until the day before her death that her condition was regarded as dangerous and for the last twenty-four hours she sank rapidly despite the efforts of medical skill to stay the progress of the disease.

Miss Henrietta Hennings was born at Steuben, Wis., on January 30, 1889; died August 12, 1908, aged 19 years, 7 months and 12 days. She came to North Dakota with her parents about twelve years ago and settled on a farm north of Courtenay where they resided until three or four years ago when they sold their farm and moved to town. She was one of the most highly respected young ladies of the community and had a host of friends among the young people who are greatly shocked by her sudden death. In two weeks from the day of her death she was to have been married to Mr. Robert Milne, and this only lends sadness to the affair and much sympathy is expressed for Mr. Milne in his sorrow for the one whom he had learned to love and adore and who was so soon to have entered with him upon that happy period of life which they had been looking forward to with so much happiness and joy.

Besides her father and mother, Miss Hennings leaves four sisters and two brothers to mourn her sudden demise. They are Mrs. Bertha Schacht of Chicago; Mrs. Ida Farris, Wauzeka, Wis.; Mrs. John A. Oster, Aberdeen, S. D.; Mrs. Eleanor Nelson, Courtenay; Charles Hennings of Chicago and Fred Hennings. Some of these will be present at the funeral.

The funeral will be held from the Presbyterian church on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. McCoy, pastor of the M. E. church at Carrington. Interment will be made in the Courtenay cemetery.
