KILLED BY LIGHTNING 3 0 A YOUNG MAN NEAR JAMESTOWN 1 KILLED IN THUNDER STORM SATURDAY EVENING. 1 Saturday evening during the thunder storm that began suddenly about 5:30 o'clock John M. Mrozek, a young man about 22 years of age, was struck and instantly killed by a bolt of lightζ ning. He was going to the assistance of Will Smith, son of G. N. Smith of Pingree, who had but a few seconds before been 1 V knocked down by a bolt of lightning which struck him as he was 1 unhitching the traces from a team that had been hitched to a binder in the field of Thomas 1 1 Pendray south of the city. One of the horses was instantly killed and fell over upon young Smith, 9 S and the three other horses at-tached to the binder were also knocked down and fell upon the horse that had been killed. Mrozek and another young man named Dick Malszycki were a short distance from where Mr. Smith was unhitching the team 3 of horses and started to go to his 3 rescue when a second bolt de-scended from the clouds with the fatal effect as above stated. Mrozek's companion was stunned 1 and knocked down but not injured. None of the other horses 3 except those being unhitched by Ł Smith were killed by the bolts. t Mr. Smith will recover. 9 Young Mrozek is about 22 1 years old. He came from Winona with his friend and has been working for some time in this 1 1 county. The remains may be taken to Dodge, Wis., for burial and Toeffel Mrozek, a half brothr er of the deceased, residing near 3 Kensal came in yesterday to look after the arrangements. Mrozek has, in addition to his half brother, an uncle of the same name residing north of Fried. The wish of the young man's family, who reside in Dodge, Wis., is that he be buried at that place.—Alert. t e
