

The silver service committee, appointed by Governor Burke to secure funds and select a suitable design for the silver service that is to be presented to the battleship North Dakota, held a meeting at Fargo yesterday and made a selection of a design.

A report from Cooperstown states that activity upon the part of Great Northern right of way agents in the purchase of property for townsite purposes along the propose new cut-off line continues. The sale of several pieces of property in Griggs county has just been recorded, while options has been secured on several others. The townsite properties are being purchased by the Great Northern Townsite Co. The starting point of this new line is as yet uncertain, but indications are that it will be at Ayr, Cass county, from which point a survey was started several years ago.

A number of sub-contractors on the line of the Midland are reported to be finishing up their work between Jamestown and Edgeley. According to the yard-ape of dirt moved so far, about 13 miles of grading has been completed.

C. A. Klaus, in charge of the silver service fund in Stutsman county, is enthusiastic over the results which have been attained so far in the country towns, but his face wears a decided pessimistic hue when asked regarding the contributions from Jamestown. So far the subscriptions have been small and it is probable that an individual canvass will be made.—Capital.
