

A PRETTY WEDDING

TOOK PLACE AT THE HOME OF MR. AND MRS. JULIUS HOHENHOUSE ON WEDNESDAY EVENING, FEB. 24TH, WHEN THEIR DAUGHTER, MISS BERTHA, BECAME THE BRIDE OF MR. OSCAR BROWN.

One of the handsomest and largest weddings of the year took place at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Julius Hohenhause Wednesday evening, Feb. 24th, when their daughter, Miss Bertha, became the bride of Mr. Oscar R. Brown, the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Brown.
