The first half of the boys' game closed 7 to 17 in Courtenay's favor. For the visitors Ralph Berlin made one field basket and Martin Darkenwald made five points from the foul line. During the same half, Robert Turner and Frank Hoffman each got a field basket. Harry Posey and Harlow Serrin each got two field baskets. Frank Hoffman got five points from the foul line and Harry Posey one.

During the second halves of both games, Wimbledon failed to score from the field. For the girls, Anetta Fried made three points from the foul line. For the boys, Martin Darkenwald made three points from the foul line.

The Courtenay boys lined up as follows: Robert Turner and Frank Hoffman, forwards, Harry Posey, center and Harlow Serrin and Arthur Nelson, guards.

During the game Robert Turner made three field baskets, Frank Hoffman three field baskets and eight foul baskets, Harry Posey three field baskets and one foul basket. Harlow Serrin two field baskets. The final score was 10 to 31 in the Courtenay boy's favor.

For the Courtenay girl's, Mary Robinson and Blanche Walsh played the forward positions, Mae Parsons, center, and Lucy McWethy and Lillian Swanson, guards. During the game Blanche Walsh made two field baskets and three from the foul line. Mary Robinson made one field baskets and Mae Parsons made one basket from the field. The final score was 5 to 11 in the Courtenay girls' favor.

Both the Wimbledon teams scored first. They played with a snap and gave the Courtenay teams a good chase. They play good basket ball. Martin Darkenwald alone scored eight points from the foul line—the same number Frank Hoffman made for Courtenay. Refreshments and games followed basket ball. The young people had a very enjoyable time.
