Two exhibition games of basket ball will be played at the opera house Friday evening by the public school basket ball teams. The girls' teams will play one game and the boys' teams one

game. A charge of 25 and fifteen cents will be made to help cover the expense of fixing up the hall for basket ball. Suitable music will be furnished between halves.

The boys' basket ball suits were ordered Monday and it is expected that they will be here in time for the game Friday.

The proceeds from the Mohr-McMillan entertainment Saturday night are to be used for the benefit of the public school library. The general admission is 50 cents with no extra charge for reserving seats. Seats may be reserved at the Stoddard Drug Co.

Basket Ball Exhibition Tomorrow Night

The basket ball teams of the Public school will play two exhibition games at Larson's hall tomorrow night. One game will be played by the two girls' teams of the school; the other by the two boys' teams.

The teams have been practicing for only a short time but under the efficient coaching of Mr. Earl Pickett they are getting into very good form.

Most of the girls have suits. The boys' suits have been ordered and it is expected that they will be here for the game Friday night.

The management has been at considerable expense in equipping the hall for basket ball work—protecting the lights, windows, etc.—and in order to cover a portion of this expense a nominal admittance will be charged. Adults 25 cts., children 15 cts.

The following comments may be of interest to those not familiar with the game:

1. Teams consist of five members—one center, who plays over a large part of the field; two forwards, whose duty is chiefly the throwing of baskets; and two guards, whose duty it is to prevent the forwards on the opposing team to throw baskets.

2. The ball is put in play at the center of the field by being tossed up between the centers who jump for it, one or both of the centers must touch the ball before it is in play.

3. For every foul called the opposing team gets a free throw at the basket from the 15 ft. line, which, if made, counts them one point.

4. Fouls are classified according to their penalties as follows:

(A) General—1. Delaying the game. 2. Tackling the ball. 3. Kicking the ball. 4. Striking the ball. 5. Advancing with the ball. 6. Hugging ball. 7. Dribbling with both hands. 8. Tackling opponent. 9. Holding opponents. 10. Pushing opponent. 11. Addressing officials.

(B) Specific—Fouls for which players may be disqualified:

1. Striking opponent. 2. Kicking opponent. 3. Shouldering opponent. 4. Tripping opponent. 5. Hacking opponent. 6. Unnecessary roughness. 7. Unbecoming language of any kind.

5. The referee is the most important official. He decides when the ball is in play, to whom it belongs and when goals are made. He has power to call all fouls.

6. Baskets made from any part of the field of play count two points.
