## One of the Largest Crowds that Ever **Assembled in Barnes County Was** Present on this Occasion

Early in eight of December as the day-light dispersed the shades of night the malodious tones of the the daychurch bell awakened the com-munity and announced the festive day of the dedication of the new St. Boniface church.

Having been silent for over a year the bell now turned her solemn duties to call the faithful to worship, to gladden the hearts on festive occasions, to toll the mourning over the departed.

When the last sacred tones were dying away and re-echoed in the hearts of the faithful, the ceremonies were ended but the dedication will be remembered by all in memories sweet and pleasant.
