

ANSWERED LAST CALL

HENRY MARTIN BOND PASSED AWAY IN THE HOSPITAL AT ROCHESTER, MINN., ON JUNE 22, AFTER AN ILLNESS OF SEVERAL YEARS.

Henry Martin Bond died at the hospital at Rochester, Minn., on Saturday, June 22, after an illness covering a period of about four years, the cause of death being due to stomach trouble.

Henry Martin Bond was born in Scott county, Virginia, on November 1st, 1842, and was 64 years, 7 months and 22 days old at the time of his death. On November 9th, 1863, he was married to Miss Susan Preece, of Inez, Kentucky, who survives him. In 1866 they moved to the state of Minnesota where they resided for more than twenty years and came to North Dakota twenty years ago last spring, and have resided in this state continuously since that time. When the call came for volunteers at the time of the civil war Mr. Bond was among the number to answer the call, although residing in the state of Kentucky, and he and one brother joined the northern forces while his father and the balance of the family were southern sympathizers. In November of 1861 he joined Company D, 39th Kentucky regiment and was on active duty until the close of the war and was mustered out in September, 1865. Those who fought along side of him say that he was one of the bravest and most fearless soldiers that ever went to the front, always ready to serve his country and fight for the right. For as much as four days at a time he has been known to be in the battle line without anything to eat or a chance to sleep, but he never faltered and would have gladly given his life for his country. Such men are surely entitled to the respect and esteem of every liberty loving American citizen.

In 1881 he was converted and united with the Baptist church and those who were most intimate with his life can give their testimony as to the consistency of his christian life and character. From the time he united with the church up the time of his death he devoted much of his time to preaching the gospel among the people of the south and it was while engaged in this work that he contracted a severe cold from which he never fully recovered and which hastened his death.

As a business man he was enterprising and energetic. He came to North Dakota twenty years ago while the country was yet in a raw state and sparsely settled and has contributed as much as almost any one else toward the development of this particular part of the state. He has built as many as four houses and has broken more than fifteen hundred acres of prairie and put it in a state of cultivation and in the pursuit of his chosen occupation acquired a liberal amount of this world's goods and was always a liberal provider for his family.

Besides his wife and a large number of friends he leaves eleven children to mourn his demise. The children are, Will Bond, Mrs. Lorenz Syverson, Mrs. A. J. Gorthy, N. E. and Johnny Bond and the Misses Madge, Elma and Anna Bond of Courtenay, Ed Bond of Plush, Oregon, Hiram Bond of McHenry

and Mrs. Geo. Harrington of Hannaford.

The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon from the Free Methodist church about twelve miles north of Courtenay and was attended by a large number of friends of the family. The service was conducted by his life long friend and associate both in times of peace and war, Amos Maynard, assisted by Rev. Kline, pastor of the Free Methodist church, and was very impressive, Mr. Maynard being closer to the real life of Mr. Bond than almost anyone else, and he spoke feelingly of the many noble traits of character of the departed. The remains were interred in the Glenfield Free Methodist cemetery.
