A QUIET WEDDING SOLEMNIZED AT THE HORN HOME ON TUESDAY EVENING WHEN THEIR DAUGHTER, BELLE, WAS MARRIED TO MR. B. H. STODDARD.

### A Centenarian

The Pingree Patriot gives the following account of a Stutsman county resident who was 101 years of age at time of death:

"At the home of his son, J. J. Seldage, near Edmunds, Moses Seldage, aged one hundred one years, died Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. Death occurred after a failing of health for only a few days previous. Mr. Seldage was born in York, England in 1806. He came to America and settled at Flint, Mich., where his son was born.
