We all look forward every week to getting the Courtenay paper as it is like receiving an old friend for we have not forgotten any of our friends there and like to hear from them. We have made some very good friends here and feel more at home and more contented as the time goes on.

This is certainly a fine country for grain growing. Flax yields 25 to 30 bushels to the acre right here in our own neighborhood. Last year there was an abundance of everything and the vegetables and gardens are surprising, green corn for the table, ripe tomatoes and such. We are going to have a good lot of small fruit put in this spring, such as raspberries, currants, goose berries and strawberries. They say they will do well here and we are going to try and see for ourselves. We have set out a nice lot of cottonwood trees and we hope to live nicely some time in the future.
