LOCAL HIVE OF THE LADIES OF
THE MACCABEES OF THE WORLD
HONOR DEAD.

SUPREME COMMANDER

MRS. LILLIAN HOLLISTER HELD
THAT POSITION FOR SIX-
TEEN YEARS.

At the regular meeting of the Paladium Hive No. 18 of the Ladies of the Maccabees, representing the local lodge, held Sept. 19, the charter of the Hive was draped in memory of Mrs. Lillian Hollister of Detroit, Mich., formerly Supreme Commander and at the time of her death Acting Past Supreme Commander. The charter will remain draped for sixty days, the unusually long period having been ordered by the Board of Trustees of the order on account of the high rank of the deceased. One hundred and sixty-three thousand members of this woman's fraternal benefit society in various places all over the United States and Canada are taking part in the same service out of love and respect to their dead leader.

Mrs. Lillian M. Hollister, Past Supreme Commander of the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World, whose death occurred Friday, August 4, 1911, at Lilley, Michigan, was Supreme Commander and leader of the Order of the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World for sixteen years, but for the past three years had been failing in health. At the supreme convention held at Atlantic City last month she was unable to be present and sent a telegram announcing that she was not a candidate for re-election, and became the Acting Past Supreme Commander, which position she held less than one month, and now the entire membership mourns the loss of the greatest leader and commander among women. In her death the Order sustains a great loss.

Mrs. Hollister was an author,

lecturer, educator, temperance missionary and church worker. She was one of the foremost women of the United States, being interested in and a promoter of many of the movements for the advancement of womankind, and for the uplifting of humanity, using voice and pen for this purpose with equal facility. She was recognized as one of the greatest parliamentarians of the age and had compiled a manual of parliamentary terms and procedure which is used by many of the leading parliamentarians of the country.

Mrs. Hollister was born and reared in Michigan. She traveled extensively in this country and in Europe and has written interestingly upon her travels.

She was a woman of commanding presence with a fine intellectual face, and possessed a charm and vivacity of manner that won an audience at once, and the phenomenal growth of the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World has been largely due to her executive ability, marked personality and personal magnetism.

The Supreme Hive Review has taken action to endow a room in a hospital at her old home town to be known as "The Lillian M. Hollister Hospital Service," said hospital service to be for the perpetual relief of some sick and disabled member of the the Ladies of the Maccabees of the World.
