After almost eighteen years of service as section foreman of the Soo railroad at this point and after resigning his position several times, August Swanson has again thrown up his job, this time for good, so he avers. Hand. ing in his resignation on several occasions the management, realizing his worth, induced him to return to their employ. This time, however, unreassonable demands and expectations made by the division roadmaster Theder of Enderlin caused Mr. Swanson to quit for keeps regardless of the remonstrations of the roadmaster notwithstanding. His place has been taken by George Carold of Brainerd, Minn. Mr. Swanson expects to either erect a small building or rent suitable quarters if they can be found and open up a boot and shoe repair shop and judging from the excellent satisfaction given by him to the trade in the past while putting in his spare hours to this work it is a safe bet that he will not lack for work.
