The head of a young dog, belonging to W. P. Clark, which recently died in a peculiar manner, was sent to the Agricultural College at Fargo for examina- s tion, some being under the be- t lief that the canine was afflicted ( with rabies. Prof. L. Van Es, who made the examination, replied in a letter upon-Mr. Clark's request that though the head of the animal had gone through a stage of putrifaction, making the examination difficult, he had found no traces of hydrophobia and the dog had died probably with from some other disease symptoms similar to the real rabies.
