

FIVE FOOT METEOR STRIKES NEAR GUPTIL

**BURRIES ITSELF SIX FEET DEEP
IN GROUND AND SIZZLES FOR
A DAY.**

Carrington, Jan. 15.—A meteor 65 inches in diameter closed its journey of millions of miles about 2 o'clock Monday morning by burying itself six feet deep on the nw $\frac{1}{4}$ 35-147-67, about seven and one-half miles northwest of Carrington.

Several residents in the near vicinity were awake at the time the meteor struck and were attracted to the doors by the brilliant light that engulfed the country for miles around. The huge ball had all the colors of the rainbow and travelled with tremendous force and speed. There was no trace of noise, except that caused when the boulder hit the ground.

For more than twenty-four hours the meteor kept hot. It was at a white heat when it struck the earth. It now has the appearance of a piece of ore. People in that section will dig it out during the next few days and it may be brought to Carrington for exhibition.

The Armentrout and Mowry families both viewed the meteor in its progress to the earth. Since its fall many people living in the Guptil vicinity have driven to the farm to see the object.
