HER NERVE FAILED

She declared that she dare not live in the house with him, and the judge, in order to alleviate her sorrows, had Tom put in the cooler for the night and the warrant was sworn out on Monday morning. But during the night Tom succeeded in getting out of the jail and it was not until nearly noon that he was again put behind the bars, and a complaint made against him charging him with the crime of jail breaking.

The trial was set for Tuesday morning at ten o'clock, but before the hour arrived Mrs. Suchla had made up her mind that Tom was a faithful and loving husband and she absolutely refused to testify against him and he was dismissed on that charge. But there stood the charge of jail breaking sworn out by the officer and Tom was called on to face that.
