

DEATH OF MRS. FOSHOLDT

MRS. O. T. FOSHOLDT DIED YESTERDAY MORNING AT ONE O'CLOCK AFTER A VERY BRIEF ILLNESS.

A pall of profoundest gloom was cast over our village yesterday morning when it was learned that Mrs. O. T. Fosholdt had passed away at one o'clock. The news came as a sudden shock to the busy world as her illness had been of so short duration that there were many who had not heard she was sick. She had been in her usual good health until Tuesday morning when she was taken with violent convulsions and from that time until death came to her relief she was only conscious a very short time. The best that medical skill and attention could do seemed to be of no avail and she gradually sank until the end was reached.

Emma Augusta Haggberg was born at Watertown, Minn., on the 18th day of July, 1874. For a few years she lived at this place and then the family moved to Smith Lake, Minnesota, where they resided for some time. On the 11th day of June 1894 she was married to Mr. O. T. Fosholdt, who was engaged in the mercantile business in Courtenay and they immediately began housekeeping here and have resided at this place up to the present time. By their union one son was born, Clarence Walter Fosholdt, who is now in his ninth year. Besides this son and her husband and an innumerable number of friends, she leaves her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Haggberg, three sisters, Amanda, Minnie, and Annie, who reside at Smith Lake, Minnesota, and two brothers, Albert and A. G. Hagberg, who have resided in Courtenay for some time, to mourn her untimely demise.

Mrs. Fosholdt was a consistent member of the Lutheran church and was confirmed in that body several years ago. She was a firm believer in the Christian religion and abounded in many Christian graces which were the outgrowth of that nobler life within which was in complete subjection to the will of her Master.

The funeral was held this afternoon, the services being conducted by Rev. Noordewier of the Presbyterian church assisted by Rev. Idsvig of Manfred. Interment took place in the Courtenay cemetery, where the remains were followed by a large number of sorrowing friends.
