

Obituary.

Died at Odell, N. D., of pleurisy and congestio: of the lungs, on Sunday evening, at 9:05 p. m., January 17th, 1892, Orrin L. North.

Orrin L. North was born in Pennsylvania in 1846; when a little boy his parents moved into Illinois and he lived there until he became of age, when he moved into New York state. In 1885 Mr. North and his family moved to North Dakota, settling on a fine farm at Odell, Barnes county. He was 45 years old last September. Mr. North was a man among men. If ever there was a man that lived a christian life it was Orrin L. North. He was a member of Griggs Lodge No. 13, A. O. U. W. One great principle of this order is the practice of charity, and if it ever was practiced, it was by our deceased brother. He was always ready and willing to inconvenience himself so that he could accommodate others. He was a loving father and a kind husband, and leaves a widow and two daughters, Miss Lillie, 17 years old, and Miss Jennie, 12 years old, to mourn his loss. No matter in what trying circumstances he was placed, he always practiced the true christianity which he professed, and when on his death bed, he did not forget his savior and he died with the sunlight of God's love shining on his face, at peace with his God and all mankind. He was indeed a noble man and faithful brother whose good work in the vineyard of this mortal world will never be forgotten, and when the sad intelligence reached the members of our lodge that our brother had "passed to that bourne from which no traveler returns," each and every one felt that they had not only lost a friend but a brother indeed. He was the head of the little community in which he lived; he was loved by all for his manly qualities and his loss is keenly felt not only by the sorrowing widow and orphans, but by the people all through that section of Barnes county. Griggs Lodge No. 13, A. O. U. W., went to Odell Tuesday, to conduct the funeral rites of the order. The day was too rough to bury the deceased brother but the lodge conducted the impressive services of the order at the house and the family and friends completed the funeral obsequies the next day.
