

## Death of Mrs. Virgo.

The people of Cooperstown received another severe shock Tuesday morning when it was told on the streets that Mrs. G. L. Virgo was dead—having died that morning at 4 o'clock a. m., of inflammation of the bowels or Peritonitis. The news seemed almost incredulous inasmuch as very few persons knew that Mrs. Virgo was sick. She was taken sick a little over a week ago, but did not take to her bed until two or three days before she died. She realized that she would not recover and she said that she was fully prepared to die, but felt very bad about leaving her little children. The deceased was a lady highly respected by the citizens of Cooperstown, and the news of her death was a sad blow to her many friends. She leaves several children, the youngest being about sixteen months old, besides her sorrowing husband to mourn her death. While it is hard for the bereaved husband to lose his helpmeet, it is doubly hard for the little ones, who have been so suddenly cut off from a mother's love and care. The heartfelt sympathy of this entire community is extended to this bereaved family.

The funeral took place Thursday afternoon at the Congregational church, the ceremony being conducted by Evergreen Lodge, No. 8, Daughters of Rebecca, of which the deceased was the chief officer. The lodge wore their regalias as did also the Odd Fellows, who were in attendance, and Griggs Lodge, No. 13, A. O. U. W. also attended the funeral in a body. Rev. G. R. Searles preached the funeral sermon. The remains were interred in the cemetery and were followed to their last resting place by a large number of friends of the deceased and family.
