Bold Burglary. When Postmaster Jimeson came down to the postoffice early Wednesday morning he discovered that his safe had been blown open and that he was out about \$300. An entrance was effected through a window at the rear end of the building. Tools belonging to Samuel Sansburn were found lying around the store. The burglar or burglars had sized up the premises pretty well. They had effected an entrance into Sansburn's blacksmith shop and helped themselves to what tools were necessary. The knob of the combination lock on the safe had been cut off with a chisel and gunpowder forced through the hole in the door where the knob had been and then the powder had been fired and blew the door off the hinges. A ducking coat had been used to muffle the blows of the hammer, and gunny sacking had been put around the safe to deaden the noise of the explosion of the powder. In their haste to get away one sack in the safe, containing some silver and notes, was overlooked. The money drawer in the store was forced out and about a dollar in change taken. There was a light in the store all night and the watchman, who patrols the town every few minutes, heard or saw nothing of the robbers. Roomers in the next building say that they did not hear anything during the night to awake them. The party or parties understood their business and did the job up in first-class shape and got away. They are probably the same fellows that cracked a safe at Northwood a few weeks ago. No clue to the robbers has yet been discovered.
