UXBRIDGE, Dec. 16, '99.

MR. TRUBSHAW:

Dear Sir:—I started from Valley City on Dec. 6th, by way of the N. P., St. P. M., I. C. and G. T., to Toronto. I then took the G. T., branch from Toronto to this city—Uxbridge. I find many changes in the appearance of the streets; as regard to the size of the shade trees, 17 years has made a wonderful change in the dimensions of the maple shade trees. Our Cooperstown will have even a better appearance in a few years, because of the fact that more taste and neatness is displayed in the arrangement of the trees. Uxbridge is an old town, with but little more population than Cooperstown, it has about 2000, I am told. It has no flag pavement at all, no more brick structures than we, but not one store building to equal that of John Syverson's beautiful block. Mostly all of the interior finish is done with common pine lumber, and very little if any of oak or Southern pine is used. It is a place of four mills, one oat mill, one tannery, two planeing mill, one
