

## Death of A. L. Bowden.

A telegram was received from Car-  
rington Monday morning conveying  
the sad intelligence of the death of  
Archie L. Bowden from heart fail-  
ure, he having passed away at 5 a  
m., that morning. The deceased  
had been sick with typhoid fever for  
two or three weeks and last week the  
fever had broken and Mr. Bowden  
was reported better, in fact last Sun-  
day night he felt much better he said  
and his wife went to bed being entire-  
ly worn out. During the night  
Archie called to Sankey, who was sit-  
ting up with him, that he was feeling  
worse and wanted the doctor. He  
continued to fail rapidly and died in  
a very short time. A wife and little  
daughter are left to mourn the loss of  
husband and father and they have the  
felt sympathy of the people of  
Cooperstown. The remains were  
brought to Cooperstown Tuesday and  
on Wednesday at 2 o'clock the fune-  
ral was held in the Methodist church,  
Rev. B. A. Burns, officiating. The  
remains were interred in the Coop-  
erstown cemetery. A. L. Bowden  
was born in Meadville, Penn., forty-  
one years ago last December. In  
1884 he moved to Cooperstown and  
for two or three years was landlord of  
the Palace Hotel and was also en-  
gaged in the general mercantile bus-  
ness with C. C. Buck under the firm  
name of Bowden & Buck. Of later  
years he was in the general store  
business at Wimbledon, N. D., until  
about two years ago, since which time  
he had been handling farms and buying  
stock. He was one of the pioneer  
citizens of Cooperstown and Griggs  
county and was known by everybody  
in the county. Many friends will  
regret to hear of his sudden death.

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
