

Mrs. Edwin Olson.

Ingeborg Marie Jensen was born in Muskege, Waukesha county, Wis., on November 7th, 1854. At the age of ten she moved with her parents to Farmington, Dakota county, Minn., where she was married on June 4th, 1874, to Edwin Olson. They came to Griggs county and settled on a homestead just northwest of Hannaford in 1883, and were thus among the earliest pioneers to locate in this county. Later they moved from the farm into town and have lived here ever since. Mrs. Olson died Friday, January 26th, 1912, at 3:30 a. m.: Bright's disease being the cause of her death.

Eight children were born to them and seven are living to mourn the loss of a devoted mother. They are Nettie, Leo, Alfred, Sydney, Edgar, Chester and Ruth, who are all residing at the parental home. Maria, their oldest child, died March 30th, 1906. Beside the bereaved husband and children deceased is survived by three brothers, Jim, Ben and Albert Johnson, and a sister, Mrs. Lykken, all of Grafton, N. D., who arrived here too late to see their sister alive, but were present at the funeral.

Funeral services were held in the Lutheran church on Tuesday afternoon, January 30; words appropriate to the occasion were spoken by Rev. Thoreson of the Lutheran church and by Rev. McLennan of the Presbyterian church. Surrounding the casket was a profusion of beautiful floral wreaths as emblems expressing the love and devotion of her many friends and relatives. The remains were interred in the cemetery north of town.

After a long, busy and useful life she died as she had lived—honored, trusted and loved. She was a woman of strong Christian character; loving, patient and self-sacrificing. She reared her own monument while she lived in the hearts of all who knew her. By her friends she will long be remembered for her gentle disposition and kindly hospitality, and those who stood nearest her will miss unspeakably a mother's counsel and advice, and a wife's gentle and loving sympathy. But her cares and labors are ended and she has entered that "peace that passeth understanding."
