DEATH OF A. D. MARIS.

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The death of constable A. D. Maris occurred at his home Thursday afternoon after an illness of several weeks While for the last few days it had not

been expected that he could recover, his death comes as a great shock to his many friends in Mt. Pleasant and

Henry county. Until about five weeks ago Mr. Maris was in fairly good health but about that time he was taken ill with what some thought was a form of brood poisoning. His illness was ag-

gravated by indigestion and liver trouble and it was reared from the first that he could not withstand the

ravages of the combined diseases. Mr. Maris was about 58 years of age. He is survived by his wife and one son, Hoadley, who is an electrical engineer

in the west. The manager of the mine where he works is away, and Mr. Maris was not able to get here for his father's funeral. Brief funeral services were held Sat-

urday afternoon at 12:30, Rev. W. P. Nicholas of the Presbyterian church having charge of the services.

The house was well filled with friends and neighbors of the deceased who have known him for many years.

Music was furnished by Mrs. Drummond, Miss Tribby, Mr. Budde, and Mr. Drummond. The pallbearers were Prof. Edwards, T. J. Talbot, Allen Ott, R. R. Fisher, W. L. Powell and

J D. Dugdale. Sympathizing members of the Ma-

sonic lodge, of which Mr. Maris was a nember, attended in a body, and accompanied the remains to the depot. In the afternoon, the funeral party

left on the K. line train for Mt. Ham l, where further funeral services were held in the Sharon church, conducted oy Rev. Nicholas. The interment was beautiful Sharon buryir g ground.

Death could have removed few men from the community who will be missed more than Mr. Maris, and the sympathy of all is extended to the widow and son.
